

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



Rebel in a smock dress Barri Brown has spent years slaving away as an English teacher in Guernsey, covering for colleagues with kids and barely tolerating the staffroom's unhygienic kitchen etiquette. With no close friends, a distant relationship with her mother and sister, and a husband who's just up and left taking her life savings with him, Barri's got nothing keeping her here.

Desperate to travel and start life over somewhere new, Barri's only chance at getting away while still being paid is to pretend she's having a baby. So she tells the school she's pregnant, orders seven bumps on the internet and sets the wheels in motion for her great pregnancy heist. All she has to do is blag it and disappear for good without getting caught and being sent to prison for fraud. How hard could it be?

On a small island like Guernsey, nightmarish. Especially when her student, fifteen-year-old irredeemable troublemaker Callum, discovers her secret. To make matters worse, Barri's fake pregnancy forces her to make genuine connections with friends and family for the first time in years and she begins to understand the true cost of her deception.

Anna Brook-Mitchell is a BAFTA Rocliffe Comedy-winning writer, actor and filmmaker. Her BBC Comedy Short Film, Man Eater – written with her screenwriting partner, Angela Nesi – TX'd on BBC Three in 2023 and was selected for Raindance 2024 as part of the Nova Express Shorts Programme. The idea is currently being developed into a feature film alongside other projects. Anna and Angela also produce, write, direct and perform in their own short films. Anna lives in London and when she isn't writing she enjoys swimming, watching sport and playing the trumpet (badly) in the City Showtunes Orchestra.



Mickey and Arlo are half-sisters. But they've never spoken and never met. Mickey's father abandoned her and her mother years ago and Mickey's hated him ever since. When she receives news of her father's passing, she's shocked to learn that he's left her his not inconsiderable fortune. The catch: Mickey must attend a series of therapy sessions before the money can be released.

Unbeknownst to either woman, the psychologist Mickey's father has ensured she meets with is her half-sister, Arlo. Having cared for her beloved father on his sickbed, Arlo is devastated to discover he's cut her out of his will with no explanation. She resolves to learn where the money went and why.

Working together as therapist and patient - with no idea that they're sisters - Arlo and Mickey soon get under each other's skin. Arlo, haunted by a tragic mistake in her professional past, is keen to redeem herself with her new client. But Mickey is sceptical of therapy and refuses to be analysed. She's struggling with an increasing dependence on alcohol, a vice she shares with her late father. As Mickey's life - both personal and professional - spirals out of control, Arlo uncovers the truth about who her new patient really is. Soon the sisters find themselves on a crash course that will either break - or save - them both.



Love stories like this never truly end.

Ever since a tragic accident ruined her childhood, Sofie has never relied on luck: in fact, she spends every day calculating risk in her work at Prospect Insurance. In life, Sofie believes in making the right choices, to work towards the best probable outcomes. But when Sofie meets Rory King, an irrepressible local television presenter, Rory's powerful and joyful sense of the infinite possibility of life sweeps her off her feet.

"I choose to focus on the possibility of good, not the probability of bad," he explains to Sofie. Despite her concerns, Sofie is won over: she and Rory marry and start to make a good life together, "hoping for the best and willing to take a chance on the future - isn't that all we can ever do?". When Sofie falls pregnant, it is the least planned thing that has happened to her since she fell in love with Rory: but she throws herself into the wild and unpredictable joy of having a baby.

But then Sofie's worst fears are confirmed: she was right, she shouldn't have risked her heart.

Sofie's pregnancy was one of the one in every 175 births that end in stillbirth: her son Leo who she only holds once. Sofie knows the statistics and her place in them but for a long time she can't make any of it add up, storing up anger and drowning in her grief. But then she starts to learn the language through which she can understand her pain and to celebrate Leo, the little life she finds she will always be glad she made. Love may be a fleeting blessing, a blink in the eye of the universe and yet it is full of infinite possibility.

The remaining question is: are she and Rory destined to stay together, despite the hard lessons of their young marriage and their crushed dreams of starting a family together? Was their love meant to be?

Ali Harris lives in Cambridge with her husband and three children. She has a degree in Performing Arts and cites theatre as her third love - after her family and books. There's not a musical she's seen (and she's seen many!) that she hasn't loved. Prior to having children, Ali was a journalist and wrote for a variety of women's magazines including Glamour, Cosmo, Red, Stylist and ELLE. 
And Lisa, who is shocked to find she is pregnant by her party hook-up, the unattainable love of her life, now faces a decision that could destroy their friendship circle for good.

One of Japan's best-selling writers unpeels the secrets connecting six lives in sprawling Tokyo.

A pastry chef on the brink of breakdown; a writing recovering from a plagiarism scandal; a student tumbling down the rabbit-hole of sugar-daddies and sex work – six distinct lives meet in this moving and unflinchingly dark novel.

Behind the façade of marital bliss and professional personas, six protagonists navigate labyrinths of expectation, assumption and hypocrisy against a backdrop of sprawling Tokyo. The narrative deftly switches between their perspectives to create a dynamic portrayal of complex relationships so that, for example, callousness in one chapter is explained as insecurity in the next. As the novel unfolds, dark truths are brought to light revealing how the characters are connected by love, lies and ultimately murder.

While violence is ever present, both bubbling under the surface in the workplace or at the fore in instances of domestic abuse, the novel never strays into gratuity. What is remarkable is the way in which Kanehara's careful writing turns an everyday act of love like preparing a picnic into something eerily unsettling and bordering on obsessive. The result is a novel which is subversive, poignant and a pleasure to read.


Rich with sumptuous descriptions of food and Kanehara's trademark dark edge, *Ataraxia* is not only a vivid and propulsive novel, but one which poses important questions about the role of fantasy and morality in the lives we all choose to construct.

For fans of *Butter*, by Asako Yuzuki, *Piglet* by Lottie Hazell and *Kim Jiyoung*, *Born 1982* by Cho Nam-Joo. Blends the polyphonic narrative of David Mitchell with the attention to food of Nora Ephron, and the violence of Shirley Jackson.

Hitomi Kanehara shot to fame with her debut novel Hebi ni Piasu, Snakes and Earrings (Vintage) which she wrote as a teenager. It was awarded both the Shosetsu Subaru Literary Prize and the Akutagawa Prize, Japan's highest literary accolade. Selling over a million copies in Japan it was made into a feature film and translated into thirty languages. The novel depicted a young woman's obsession with body modification. Since then, Kanehara has published thirteen works of fiction, including Autofiction (Vintage) longlisted for the Man Asian Literary Prize. Mothers, written while living in France, was awarded the Bunkamura Deux Magots Literary Prize.

MOON TIGER

Rex Juba delivers Ancient Rome from an exciting new angle. Kenrick uses Juba as a lens, a vehicle allowing us to look with fresh eyes at a period that is incredibly familiar to us, adjusting our Western centric approach. Juba II turns out to be a lynch pin, a missing thread connecting so many well-known figures from Roman history: Anthony and Cleopatra, Julius Caesar, Herod, Octavia and Octavian, later Emperor Augustus, Caligula. Good comps would be Catullus's Bedspread by Daisy Dunn, Pax by Tom Holland and River Kings by Cat Jarman.

Juba II was a slave who went on to become an African King. He was one half of an extremely successful marriage, indeed his was the only kingdom in which the king and queen were invested with equal power. He was a renowned scholar who wrote many books (he was known as the Most Scholarly King), an avid collector of art and a patron of artists. This biography takes that rich material culture as a springboard, telling the story of his kingdom through the artefacts that have been found by archaeologists excavating in North Africa; from carnelian signet rings to rare gold coins and exquisite ancient Egyptian statues. In adopting this approach, a new story of the ancient world can be told, one that has too-often been pushed to the margins. For while Juba's story is fascinating in its own right it is his identity as a Roman-African citizen that makes it all the more important that it be told now, challenging as it does prevailing perspectives on race and ethnicity in ancient Rome.

This book works to lower our gaze from the northern shores of the Mediterranean to the southern, for of course Roman civilisation flourished just as much in Africa as it did in Europe. In doing so, the book will complicate the image that springs to mind when we think of the Romans, as well as pose the question that the Romans were constantly asking themselves: Who gets to be called 'Roman'? And what did being a Roman citizen really mean?

Andrew Kenrick teaches Creative Writing and Archaeology at UEA. His first degree was in Ancient History and Archaeology and his MA dissertation was on Roman Cookery and its celebrity chefs. His PhD at UEA in Life Writing focused on finding new ways to write ancient biographies. He is the winner of the 2023 Tony Lothian Award for Best Unpublished Biography. Rex Juba is his first trade book, planned for delivery at the end of 2024.



The Hotel Lutetia in Paris has recently re-opened after a multimillion makeover, catering to a well-heeled international clientele. But a discreet plaque outside the building hints at its earlier, more complex history.

After 1933 it became one of the many Paris hotels in which writers, artists and intellectuals sought refuge from Nazi Germany. 

Experienced journalists for Bloomberg, one British and one American, both fully embedded personally in Germany and German-ness, they experience the day-to-day frustrations of citizenship while having the privileged access of official observers. This is their first book.

From our first periods, to childbirth and the menopause, we are taught that femaleness constitutes inevitable, debilitating pain. It is time to rectify this narrative: it is not always just 'a bad period'.

Instead, to be female is to be human: and as such, to have the right to be heard, supported, and given adequate and empathetic treatment.

Evelyn Scott is a writer, former university lecturer and an advocate for endometriosis, disability, and women's health. Evelyn was a teenager when she first began suffering from the symptoms that she would (15 years later) find out were due to endometriosis, a condition which affects 1 in 10 women. These fifteen years were defined by constant pain, detrimental misdiagnoses, and medical failings at every turn, which forced her to abandon her PhD programme and left her disabled. She has written for and/or been featured on Channel 5 News, The Times, The Metro, iNews, The Mirror, WalesOnline, CoventryLive, Tortoise Media, Get Surrey and the Daily Mail, and has a loyal following of 60,000 on Instagram.

Personal and political, Renaturing will ignite conversation about how we can support the natural world around us.

At a time when everyone seems to be talking about rewilding – returning land to a natural, self-sustaining ecosystem – James Canton asks whether it is really something anyone could do. What if you don't happen to own a large tract of land for example?

Renaturing shows how the concept of rewilding can be adapted, so that is can be adopted by us all. We can all make positive change, however large or small. We can all be involved in caring for and restoring the natural world.

Sugarheads will take what seems like an innocuous, even trivial foodstuff, and enquire deeply about what our relationship with sugar today tells us about power, our mental and emotional health, the ideas that have got us so far, and how the world could be different, fairer, more balanced.

Lucy will consider the many faces of this store-cupboard staple and consider the role of sugar as colonial export; modern political carrot; emotional crutch; parental bargaining chip; sustainer of late-stage capitalism; destroyer of habitats; social anaesthetic; symbol of celebration and enemy of physical health.

The book will answer questions ranging from the political to the personal, the medical to the philosophical - Are we eating too much, and does it matter? Is overconsumption a choice? Who holds the power over how sugar is marketed? How does sugar trouble ideas of 'the natural'? What does it mean to live in a world where sugar both symbolises a happy birthday and annihilates indigenous populations? How does over -indulgence work morally in an economy predicated on excess? Would quitting sugar stop Lucy's recurrent depression?

Crucially, the book is not an anti-sugar book, but rather something much broader and deeper. Lucy relishes the idea of using language to convey the sensory delights of molten chocolate and oozing syrup sponge - only for this prose to harden and crystalise into an important work of ecofeminism and environmental philosophy.
