



It's December 2007, the last Wednesday before Christmas. The last post has gone and it's quiet in the Post Office. Mr Sidhu looks forward to spending another Christmas alone, after losing his wife years earlier. His last promise to her was to make sure his grown-up children, Raju and Meenu, were settled and comfortable—which meant helping Raju to buy his own place and seeing to it that Meenu finally married her long-term fiancé, Craig.

He is thrown off course when Rose, the woman who works diligently alongside him in the shop at the front of the Post Office, asks him to join her for Christmas lunch. He is still grieving his wife, Sarabjit, but more and more, he finds himself thinking about Rose—her sparkling blue eyes and her kindness, not to mention what a good worker she is.

When the weekly accounts keeps registering losses in the post office, Mr Sidhu doesn't know what to do. Meanwhile his children are increasingly distant with him, unsettled about the growing closeness between him and Rose and frustrated by the pressure they feel Mr Sidhu is putting on them both to settle down.

What they can't seem to realise is that Mr Sidhu is just trying to do his best.

As the losses increase exponentially, Mr Sidhu has to face up to the fact that this could be the end of everything. Rather than asking for help, he ends up pushing everyone away and can't seem to get anything right. Will those in the community who Mr Sidhu has served so loyally rally around him before it's too late? Will his children ever forgive him?

A moving portrait of finding romance later on in life and the immigrant experience.

Amman Brar is a writer and theatre maker. He has an MA in Creative Writing from the University of East Anglia. He was one of the inaugural winners of the BBC Writersroom 10 Award for his play *Punjabi* Boy with Tamasha Theatre Co, where he was also Artist in Residence. 

Working together as therapist and patient – with no idea that they're sisters – Arlo and Mickey soon get under each other's skin. Arlo, haunted by a tragic mistake in her professional past, is keen to redeem herself with her new client. But Mickey is sceptical of therapy and refuses to be analysed. She's struggling with an increasing dependence on alcohol, a vice she shares with her late father. As Mickey's life—both personal and professional—spirals out of control, Arlo uncovers the truth about who her new patient really is. Soon the sisters find themselves on a crash course that will either break – or save – them both.

A remarkable short story collection from *New Yorker* excerpted author Danielle Dutton, which pushes the limits of language in moody, dream-like prose.

In *Prairie, Dresses, Art, Other*, Danielle Dutton imagines new models for how literature might work in our fractured times. Dutton's writing is as protean as it is beguiling, using the different styles and different spaces of experience to create a collage of the depths and strangeness of contemporary life.

'Prairie' is a cycle of surreal stories set in the quickly disappearing prairieland of the American Midwest, replete with wildflowers, ominous rivers, fireflies, cattle lowing and ghostly apparitions; 'Dresses' paints a wild and moving portrait of literary fashions; 'Art' is an imaginative illustrated essay which explores the relationship between fiction and visual art; and 'Other' offers an assemblage of irregular stories and essays that are hilarious or heartbreaking by turns.

Out of these varied materials, Dutton builds a haunting landscape of wildflowers, megadams, black holes, violence, fear, virtual reality, abiding strangeness and indefinable beauty.





Hekate sings the story of its eponymous heroine. Born into a world on fire and at war, she and her mother are abandoned by the menfolk of their Titan family who must head into battle against the new Gods, the Olympians. Tragedy ensues when Hekate and her mother are forced to flee their home as the Olympians overpower and enslave the Titans, including Hekate's father, Perses, and gain dominion over the universe. It is a bitter civil war. In a bid to protect Hekate from the clutches of Zeus and Poseidon, her mother leaves her in the underworld with the goddess Styx and king of the underworld, Hades, where she must make a life for herself and discover her divine purpose.

Here begins Nikita Gill's beautiful and propulsive reimagining of Hekate's myth which unfolds into a coming-of-age adventure story and quest in which our young protagonist – not yet a goddess – sets out to discover what has happened to her parents, heal from the trauma of her separation from them, make a new home for herself in the underworld, and, eventually, step into her true power as a woman and goddess, before it's too late.

In the novel's second strand, we meet George Smith, the auto-didact, working-class genius who in the 1850s taught himself to read the ancient cuneiform script, and became the first modern translator of Gilgamesh -- a role that brought him first fame, then tragedy.

The Cold War of 1945–90 was dominated by the threat of nuclear conflict but the new front-line will be economic, specifically the currencies in which international business is done. Nations who seek to undermine American hegemony are trying to do so by weakening the power of the dollar, and China's now decade-long investment in their Central Bank Digital Currency (CBDC) or digital yuan is the main weapon in this fight.

For decades following the post-war Bretton Woods settlement, the US dollar was the reserve currency of choice and oil had to be paid for in dollars. But no longer. Now over 100 countries are developing CBDCs as both a potential alternative to the dollar but also, crucially, to utilize the technological possibilities that a digital currency can offer in terms of control and surveillance. The US and other liberal democracies may worry about TikTok but that's nothing compared to the data that can be mined by non-liberal actors like the Chinese Communist Party from monitoring digital transactions, whether it's buying groceries or doing international business.

This book is a powerful argument for how, if the West is to claw back China's huge head-start on digital currencies, it needs to act fast, and act now.

Brunello Rosa is a professor of economics who runs an international consultancy firm. He advises companies and governments and has already addressed a G7 forum in Germany specifically on the geopolitical ramifications of CBDCs.

The UK trials of Gayle Newland caused a sensation in the tabloids and captured international attention. In 2015, Newland was charged with a rare offence called 'sexual fraud'. The complainant, Miss X, told the courtroom that, for two years, she believed she had a boyfriend named Kye Fortune. Every time they met up, she claimed she wore a blindfold. One day, during a liaison, she took off the blindfold and found her best friend, Newland, having sex with her. Soon after, she filed a complaint, telling police that she'd been raped by her best friend, pretending to be her boyfriend — a man she now realised didn't exist.

Newland was found guilty in 2015. She appealed and was granted a retrial. In 2017 she was found guilty again. Newland denied the allegations, insisting there was no blindfold and that she and her friend were secret lesbians—lovers in the closet enacting a shared fantasy, a role play that had been going on for years.

It is this startling and controversial case that forms the backdrop of *The Bed Trick*—a masterful and incisive work that draws on archival research and legal scholarship to reach beyond traditional reportage, asking: What claims are legible to a courtroom? What bodies and acts are considered unreasonable and unnatural? What assumptions underpin the law? Who is protected by these assumptions, and who is not?

Izabella Scott is a writer and editor living in London. Ghost of Iron Mountain is the jaw-dropping story of a literary hoax – the publication in 1967, at the height of the war in Vietnam, of what purported to be a top-secret US government report into the 'possibility and desirability of peace' which asserted that the US economy would collapse if the war ended. So plausible was it, so perfect in its reproduction of the register of such documents, that it was widely believed and caused a furore which reached to the heart of the White House.

Eventually the hoaxers – including the not-yet-famous E. L. Doctorow – were unmasked, and *Report from Iron Mountain* faded into obscurity. Until one day, years later, when the principal author, a failed writer called Leonard Lewin, was asked how the *Report* had come to be republished by a magazine peddling Holocaust denial and similar altright conspiracies. Far from being forgotten, it turned out the *Report* had been embraced by those for whom the idea of a 'high cabal' pulling the strings was not just possible but real. 'It's a hoax!' they said. 'Ah, but they would say that, wouldn't they?' A whole swathe of people from nutty shock-jocks and Kennedy conspiracists to Timothy McVeigh, the man behind the 1995 Oklahoma City bombing, were influenced by it to varying degrees, and its after-lives are arguably more significant than the original controversy.

Joining the dots between the real 'Mr X' from Oliver Stone's *JFK* to the Waco siege, 'chemtrails' and MAGA Republicans, *Iron Mountain* is a masterly dissection of one of the most curious but resonant underpinnings of modern America. It asks us, in the post-truth age, what the real costs are of not knowing where fiction ends and non-fiction begins.

And as she enters the sleeplessness, chaos and intimate discoveries of life with a newborn, these animal stories become Helen's companions and guides – revealing the deceits inherent in the image of the 'natural' mother, and compelling her to explore where her own animality begins and ends.

In this intricately woven domestic memoir blending cutting-edge research from the fields of evolutionary and human biology, nature writing and natural history, Jukes explores the much overlooked idea that the mothering body is worthy of our observation. What Jukes discovers is both surprising and important. The philosophical questions raised by her various enquiries serve to completely undermine conventional ideas of gender, hierarchy and individual autonomy.







As Britain emerged from post-war austerity, no one embodied its newfound spirit of hedonism and glamour like April Ashley. A fashion model and socialite who rose from poverty in Liverpool to the heights of London society via Le Carrousel nightclub in Paris, she was also one of the first Britons to undergo gender-affirming surgery.

Ashley was appointed MBE for services to transgender equality in 2012, but her journey towards acceptance was hard-won and bitterly contested. In 1961, a friend sold her story to a tabloid and she feared that she would never work in the UK again. Instead, she blazed her own trail, rubbing shoulders along the way with the bohemians and jetsetters who had risen to prominence in the Swinging Sixties.



As he writes his book with Laurie he holds his children in mind as his readers and starts to understand the structural and racial challenges that have defined his life.

Most of all, *Stray* is a book about belonging - about finding your place in the world whether through music, through family, through place or through shared experience.

Laurie Owens is of Welsh and French origin. She grew up near, then lived in, Bristol. 



Sex and abortion, pregnancy and birth, feeding and rocking and washing: these are embodied practices with a past, the domain of history. But the history of the female body is largely unknown — even unimagined. Attending closely to narratives of desiring, labouring and caring, *Pure Presence* offers a radical reinterpretation of the female body through the lens of history, and asks how the past might uphold or resist contemporary notions of bodily freedom.

Interweaving archival encounters with the author's own personal experiences, *Pure Presence* creates a dialogue between present conceptions of the female body and the premodern past. She uncovers more expansive and unruly ways of figuring the body, and in the process discovering a startling truth; that the body is not merely a possession or agent of the mind, but carries its own particular freedoms and autonomies.

At once intimate and expansive, rigorous and deeply felt, *Pure Presence* provides a searching account of this notion of bodily freedom, asking what we might learn from a deeper history when the female body – its vulnerabilities, its pains and desires – was figured differently. In doing so, it considers how else we might imagine the body and its rights, what might the sources be for a more generous bodily imagination, and what new historical narratives might emerge from an attention to these questions.

Erin Maglaque is a historian and critic. She has a D.Phil in History from the University of Oxford, and has held research fellowships and visiting professorships at Oxford, Harvard, the University of Toulouse, and the National Humanities Center in the U.S. Her research has focused on the history of gender, the body, and the family. She has published award-winning research articles on these subjects, and an academic monograph about gender and family life in early modern Venice that was widely reviewed. Erin writes regularly about history, gender, and feminism for the London Review of Books, the New York Review of Books, the New York Times Book Review, and the New Statesman. Her essays have been translated into multiple languages. She has presented on Free Thinking for BBC Radio 3, the LRB Podcast, and NPR.
