





Four siblings spend their first holiday together alone in their father's house in France. The boys don't really know him, he left them for the girls' mother, his second wife. The middle two children, born just six months apart, a result of their father's philandering, are attracted to each other, something they try not to acknowledge but which keeps pushing its way to the surface. Each of the siblings bring a crisis of sorts to the holiday, as they try to establish themselves as a family in a new shape.



A stylish debut novel exploring the tensions between identity, language and desire.

"Memory is the origin of all stories, and if stories are the only way we can make ourselves known to others, then it has only been with the writing of this confession that I have found the means to reveal to others who I really am..."

Two Lives opens with an unnamed narrator discovering a memoir written by a friend he knew ten years ago, during their time at university together in Dublin. As the narrative unfolds, it alternates between accounts of their involvement with the Occupy movement in Ireland, their understandings of art and politics, and above all, their memories of the mercurial and elusive 'D': the memoirist's girlfriend, and the narrator's best friend.

As their perspectives slowly diverge, we realise nothing about these two men is as it initially seems: neither the story they tell about their pasts, nor those they tell about their feelings for one another. It is left to the reader, in conclusion, to decide what has been the true story of these two lives, and that of the woman, D, who drew them together and forced them apart.

Driven by a plot of repressed desire, and narrated in two distinctive voices, this is a novel that questions what we can ever know about another person, as well as one which offers up fiction as compensation for the disappointments of that quest.



Sir Edward Feathers has had a brilliant career, from his early days as a lawyer in Southeast Asia, where he earned the nickname Old Filth (Failed In London, Try Hong Kong) to his final working days as a respected judge at the bar. Sophia is a 28-year-old playwright staging her first professional play. Her art has always been created in the shadow of her father, a successful novelist now in his 60s. 

Diane Oliver (1943 – 1966) was born in Charlotte, North Carolina where she went to public schools. '*Neighbors*' was a recipient of an O. Henry Award in 1967. Diane began graduate work at the University of Iowa's Writers' Workshop and was awarded the MFA degree posthumously days after her death in a motorcycle accident in 1966.

The life and loves of a rural Exmoor man, spanning the last 50 years of the Earth's Great Acceleration.

This is the story of Thomas Hedley, a rural man whose lifetime spanned the period of The Great Acceleration, from the 1950s to now. In Davies's almost miraculous retelling of the story he himself gave her, it is as if a world has just been found, remembered rather than written. In the same way, Davies gently shows us, our life choices around climate warming, have inescapable consequences, just as Thomas's did.

'It's only when you add up all those small things that you get a sum so fraught with heartache you can't even start to reckon on how much you've lost'. So Thomas's story is also, in essence, our own.



A lyrical pastoral memoir chronicling the natural cycles of a year at a small sheep farm.

Part nature writing, part farming memoir, an octogenarian shepherdess condenses a lifetime of experience into a careful and considered account of the responsibility, joys and lows of farming life. McLean's ancestors left their home in Scotland and emigrated to Canada in the 19th Century, they settled on land newly stolen from the First Nation people, just a few miles down the road from where Barbara now farms. Years later, in 1969, Barbara experiences something of the sweetness available to those who choose to live close to the land. An emotional bargain of sorts is struck. She eschews a life of sophistication and comfort and opts instead for sheep.

McLean takes on a rundown farm in Ontario, no electricity, heating or running water, arriving on a cold January day under heavy snow. Her husband, as the local rural doctor, is largely absent. Barbara begins to sculpt a new life for herself, a life with sheep and all that they teach her; 'through my own pregnancies I began to see the ewes differently, to relate to their lumbering bodies, the awkward shifting to find a comfortable position. I felt an unborn lamb kick when I rested my hand on a ewe's flank as my own foetus kicked in time. Connection'.

Now at the other end of her life, Barbara looks back over fifty years of being a shepherd and at all that has changed in that time:-

The climate, markedly so, measurably so, evidently so. Working on the land in the farther Northern Hemisphere, it's not a discussion in the newspapers, it's a daily visceral difference. Her body, what it will no longer do, the small changes and the bigger ones, the psychological ones, things she thought she wouldn't care about, that now she is fearful of. Farming, the cycle of the year turning. The back to the land movement in the 1960's looks like heady idealism today in contrast with shades of - brutal survivalism in the face of incoming ecodisaster that colours that of the 2020's.

Touchstone would be *A Shepherd's Life* by James Rebanks with a touch of late Mary Wesley and Joan Didion by way of Nan Shepherd.

Neurological conditions can change people dramatically. Patients with brain disorders can seem strange and behave in unusual ways. Some may become socially inappropriate, lacking in empathy, being rude or aggressive. Others may be deeply impulsive, suddenly gambling away large amounts of money or developing new addictions. Some can develop pathological apathy becoming withdrawn and lacking motivation to interact with people, while others are unable to understand concepts and slowly lose the ability to communicate. Neurological conditions can also lead to deterioration of memory, or difficulty in recognizing objects, inability to attend to information that is important, or even loss of the ability to speak, read or write.

These are only some of the ways in which any of us might change with a brain disorder such as a stroke, head injury or dementia. Alterations in behaviour or personality like these can be extremely upsetting and frightening. They can all effectively make us outsiders, somehow seeming foreign even to our closest friends and family.


In recent years, neuroscience has made major advances and now reached a point where it is possible to use our understanding of brain functions to explain such changes in behaviour in people with neurological conditions. This book provides the reader with a modern understanding of the cognitive mechanisms and brain systems that become dysfunctional in brain disorders.

We'll find out what the alteration that occurred in them tells us about how our brains create our identities, to make us who we are and to gain us access to our social networks. When we lose one aspect of that identity – such as the ability to make good decisions, empathize, or remember information – we can seem unrecognizable to people who know us well. Soon we can become an outsider. Our brains create identities which allow us to be insiders in our social groups. This is how we function well in society. An important and fascinating book for an era in which dementia is becoming endemic.

Masud Husain is Professor of Neurology & Cognitive Neuroscience at the University of Oxford and Professorial Fellow at New College, Oxford. He has published over 200 research articles, including in Nature and Science and edited the Oxford Textbook of Cognitive Neurology & Dementia. He is Editor-in-Chief of *Brain*, a leading international journal of neurology. He is a practising clinician with over 25 years' experience of seeing people with a range of neurological conditions. Matrescence combines personal memoir with a cultural, social, scientific and philosophical investigation into the experience and major transition of early motherhood.

Jones asks, why are so many new mothers in crisis? What is it about modern Western motherhood that is making people unhappy? What actually happens when women become mothers? How a famous 1960s hoax became the bible of modern conspiracy theorists.

Iron Mountain is the jaw-dropping story of a literary hoax - the publication in 1967, at the height of the war in Vietnam, of what purported to be a top-secret US government report into the 'possibility and desirability of peace' which asserted that the US economy would collapse if the war ended. So plausible was it, so perfect in its reproduction of the register of such documents, that it was widely believed and caused a furore which reached to the heart of the White House.

Eventually the hoaxers – including the not-yet-famous E. L. Doctorow – were unmasked, and *Report from Iron Mountain* faded into obscurity. Until one day, years later, when the principal author, a failed writer called Leonard Lewin, was asked how the *Report* had come to be republished by a magazine peddling Holocaust denial and similar altright conspiracies. Far from being forgotten, it turned out the *Report* had been embraced by those for whom the idea of a 'high cabal' pulling the strings was not just possible but real. 'It's a hoax!' they said. 'Ah, but they would say that, wouldn't they?' A whole swathe of people from nutty shock-jocks and Kennedy conspiracists to Timothy McVeigh, the man behind the 1995 Oklahoma City bombing, were influenced by it to varying degrees, and its after-lives are arguably more significant than the original controversy.

Joining the dots between the real 'Mr X' from Oliver Stone's *JFK* to the Waco siege, 'chemtrails' and MAGA Republicans, *Iron Mountain* is a masterly dissection of one of the most curious but resonant underpinnings of modern America. It asks us, in the post-truth age, what the real costs are of not knowing where fiction ends and non-fiction begins.
